We will rendezvous in Boone, North Carolina on Wednesday evening, June 27. The Best Western Blue Ridge Plaza is holding a block of rooms until May 31 under MOGSouth for the night of Wednesday, June 27. The room rate is \$62.55 plus tax for up to four in a room and includes a Continental breakfast the next morning. The motel is approximately 5 miles from the Parkway. Friends

We left Tony after he'd wrecked his '55 Twin spare roadster "somewhere in Canada". We next see him in Seattle, Christmas of '67, back in town after a year of the Grand Tour in Europe. He married well and during the Tour they'd ordered a new Morgan four-seater from a dealer in London. Problem was that after '67 it will be years before any new Morgans will be sold in the United States. Eventually the dealer in London coughs up the money for the new Mog and Tony and Sylvia buy a used '66 4 seater from Bill Fink in Frisco where they settle down to wedded bliss. A couple of times when my squeeze and I would come through Frisco there'd be a nice little bedroom and a lovely Mog 4 seater. Now if you can name a better town or a better way to see it than San Francisco in a Morgan, I'm listening. Often I'd be handed the keys, "Wanna drive?". It was during those moments I'd say "I gotta have a Mog". But not one of these ugly 4 seaters. In those days I was so ignorant I didn't even know there was such a thing as a Drophead Coupe to covet. So it was always a roadster for me. It was much later that I came to the conclusion that the 4 seater is thee way. It isn't that I need to carry 4 people all the time, on the occasions when you do, you can share the Morgan's fun.

Now we come to the time when my fate was sealed. I decide to move to San Francisco and Tony and Sylvia have me till I land a job and a place to stay. Take the Morgan and find a job. I must have applied at every foreign car dealer and many domestic dealers for a parts counterman job. What I didn't know was that these jobs were union jobs at a handsome wage, within the city. I imagine the dealers response being OK maybe I gotta pay this cause I can't be a dealer without a parts facility, BUT I can do it with one parts man, not two or six like the usual parts rooms. For three weeks I drive that Morgan to every dealer in town with not one call back. I'd been given a couple of addresses in Berkeley and thus not unionized as in Frisco. One day in Berkeley and I have two job offers.

It was during the three weeks driving the Morgan all over San Francisco that everywhere I went people would smile at me, every day, men, women, boys, girls, dogs, and cats, black ,white, brown, yellow, pink, gay, straight, cops, bus drivers, one and all smiled and smiled some more. It is that delicious shape, the leather, the open, the dash, the panache. People don't know it won it's class at LeMans, that it's the last of the square riggers, the only perpendicular car still built, they can just see the sweet lines as we can. And that's what brings out those smiles, the little boys pointing. That's why I had to have a Morgan. How 'bout you?

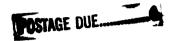
