

MogSouth Spring Meet May 19-21 Townsend, TN by: Randy and Dale Johnson

The Spring Meet was held May 19-21 in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park and was hosted by Martha and Matt McClellan.

With Dale having to work most of the day of May 19, I took off mid-morning to meet Charlie and Maidie Williams at their home to caravan to Tennessee. Our younger son Adam and daughter Amy came in Amy's car, as she was traveling later in the weekend to western New York state to work for the summer. Tips from Fred

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With many of us taking road trips this summer here is a tip as to items you may want to include in your Morgan "just in case".

Be a Boy Scout

"Be Prepared" is the boy scout motto. Not bad advice. What do you carry for spares? I tend to over prepare, but then again, I can usually cope with road problems. Wish they didn't happen at night though....

The best way to be prepared is to know your car. There will always be the unexpected, but if you do the maintenance yourself, massage and improve things as you go, it will become less of a mystery to you and more reliable. For instance, I used to carry extra wire, testers, etc. After re-wiring my Morgan, I KNOW where all the wires go and that I'll have no electrical problems.

Still in all, for long trips I gather-Assortment of hose clamps from small to

super large, handful of wire tyes, bag of assorted nuts, boits and washers, tan belt, feeler gauges, three Phillips and three regular screwdrivers, 3/8" to 3/4" combination wrenches, 4 BS wrenches 7/16BS, 3/8BS, 5/16BS, & 1/4BS, 3/8" drive socket set with American sockets, 3 extensions, sparkplug wrench, 9/16BS, 1/2BS, 7/16BS, 3/8BS, 1/4BS sockets, large and small ViseGrips, Channel locks, small pliers, needlenose, sidecuts, set of small ignition wrenches, large and medium Crescent wrenches, two road flares, used/good front wheel bearings (greased/ZipLocked), electric fuel pump, small WD-40, Permatex UltraBlue, roll of safety wire, wheel hammer, bypass hose to use in case of oil cooler failure (used five times!).

Sound like overkill? Maybe. I could damn near overhaul a Morgan with what I take, but all this fits nicely into an "Old Pal" fishing box. No problem taking it along, if just for the piece of mind.

In a ZipLock bag I keep an assortment of spare bulbs and a couple of fuses. If I didn't have electronic Ignition, I'd carry spare points.

I carry a scissor-jack. The handle is under the mat on the passenger's side and the Jack Is held to the rear crossmember (under the spare tyre) with wing nuts.

Oh yea.... Boy Scout flashlight and two books, <u>Manifold Destiny</u> and <u>Notes From a Morgan Garage</u>.

COOKBOOK

This is the only cookbook that I know of with actual recipes and number of driving miles necessary, for cooking dinner right on the car engine.

Especially in a Morgan, you want to bleed-off heat in the summer. Why not let some food absorb it? This book also might serve as a nice introduction to REAL AMERICAN food. I doubt if many travelers' to the US <u>ever</u> get to try (or even see!) such classics as "mom's Tuna Wiggle" or "Hot Dog Surprise". You need this book and it's only eight bucks.
