MOGSouth at MOG 31

CCDC's MOG 31 was a ball and I am sure I can say that for all MOGSouth members that attended.

As you remember several members had plans to meet and travel the Blue Ridge Parkway to the meet in Staunton, Virginia, site of MOG 31. In my mind, the trip was half the fun.

Dale and I left Atlanta at 8:30 on Wednesday morning, June 27 and met Lance and Connie Lipscomb on I-85 at 9:15. We then motored through Northeast Georgia to Scenic Highway 11 in South Carolina where we met Gene and Betsy McOmber at our rendezvous point, Aunt Sue's where we enjoyed a very good lunch but decided to forego dessert in order to enjoy ice cream, later in the afternoon, at The Switzerland Inn at Little Switzerland, NC, just off the Parkway.

We reached the Parkway via US 276 through Brevard, NC and that part of the ride was just a prelude to what we were to enjoy once we reached the Parkway. So far Dale and I had traveled approximately 200 miles to reach the Parkway and we were to travel an additional 120 miles to reach our destination for Wednesday night, Boone,

NC. We stopped in Little Switzerland around 4:45 that afternoon and while enjoying our ice cream in the parking lot, a lady approached us and started asking us about our Morgans and where we were headed. As it turns out, the lady is John Sheally's sister who has a summer home in the area and being John' sister, knows a great deal about Morgans. With a wave and request for John to call his sister, we continued on to Boone, arriving at the Best Western motel at 6:30. Eric Cummins Plus Four was in the parking lot, with Eric, Ann and Scott having arrived earlier in the day. We cleaned up a bit and met Mae and John Councill for dinner at The Red Onion. Mae and John were planning to travel to Staunton on Friday but did give us important information regarding a detour to the Parkway northbound from Boone.

With the exception of the brake lights on Lance's Plus Eight not working and a problem with the starter on Eric's Plus Four, it appeared we were ready to continue on Thursday morning for the 170 mile drive to Roanoke, VA.

Lee and Trisha Gaskins had called from the road and were scheduled to arrive in Boone at 9:30 that morning to join us for the rest of the trip to Roanoke.

As I was checking things under the bonnet while fueling the Plus Four, I noticed that the water pump pulley was loose and wobbling, possibly requiring a major repair. At that point I made the decision to hook up the car to Dale's Explorer and return to Atlanta, as I did not want to attend my first MOG in nine years and not have a Morgan to drive. Fortunately, everyone convinced me to change my mind and assured me that we could fix the problem once we arrived in Staunton.

So with Dale and I leading the way towing the Plus Four, we made our way to the Parkway. Of course we immediately ran into a road construction back up when leaving the motel but after about a 30-minute delay, we were on our way. It was a beautiful day for driving and I was surprised at how well the Plus Four and Explorer handled together on the Parkway.

At lunchtime we exited the Parkway at Mt. Airy, NC and enjoyed a great lunch at the Lake View Café. You should know that we did also enjoy dessert, Lance having pointed out that we were on vacation and those calories do not count while on vacation.

The run to Roanoke was easy and we arrived at the Colony House Motel about 4:00PM noticing the difference in temperature from high up on the Parkway to down in the Roanoke Valley to be considerable, 74 versus 90. Amazing!

Friends:


This month's epistle is about that ubiquitous tail lamp, the Lucas L-549 as seen on many, many British cars including our everloving Moggies.

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
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
